My travels recently took me to Liverpool. This wasn't work, and given my recollection is that when asked my answer was "if you really need people let me know and I'll check" I think it only just squeezes under the bar of "volunteered". Either way, I was down to assist with the Youth Congress taking place as part of Adoremus, the National Eucharistic Congress. With the recent press coverage of the US church's divisions feeling unrelenting I saw social media speculation as to whether anyone would want to attend such a gathering at a time when the church feels very fractured and hurting. I don't know about the main congress, but the youth event was sold out, and over 800 young people attended for a day of thought, reflection and worship together. Being there to help I was involved with setting up, welcoming people and being one of the Salesian Youth Ministry team helping with the day. Even though I was there working, and spent a good part of the afternoon backstage there is something life-giving about the chance to contribute to these type of events. It was the same when we completed our 'Beyond the Walls' event here in Scotland at the start of September. A new project for J&P Scotland we brought together 8 organisations (including other Bishops' Conference offices and Scottish Catholic charities) with students from 10 schools to explore Catholic Social Teaching and some of the charisms and missions of catholic groups whose work bears witness to the church in the world. Its been a very busy, but very rewarding few weeks.



The first video from film-maker Julia Bacha asks why the world's press ignores stories about nonviolence drawing on her work in the Holy Land.

In 2003, the Palestinian village of Budrus mounted a 10-month-long nonviolent protest to stop a barrier being built across their olive groves. Did you hear about it? Didn't think so. Brazilian filmmaker Julia Bacha asks why we only pay attention to violence in the Israel-Palestine conflict -- and not to the nonviolent leaders who may one day bring peace.

We're not going to end violence by telling people that it's morally wrong, says Jamila Raqib, executive director of the Albert Einstein Institution. Instead, we must find alternative ways to conduct conflict that are equally powerful and effective. Raqib promotes nonviolent resistance to people living under tyranny -- and there's a lot more to it than street protests. She shares encouraging examples of creative strategies that have led to change around the world and a message of hope for a future without armed conflict. "The greatest hope for humanity lies not in condemning violence but in making violence obsolete," Raqib says.

Our third piece is from Jeremy Gilley on the origins of the Peace One Day – which led to the UN adoption of 21st September as World Day of Peace .
