

PRAYERS TO CONFRONT POVERTY IN SCOTLAND

Challenge Poverty Week 15-21 October 2017







Introduction

The 17th of October is the United Nations Day for the Eradication of Global Poverty.

On that day, across the world, people come together in solidarity with those who suffer poverty and injustice. For a number of years, I have attended one such gathering in Glasgow's George Square. As I have listened to the injustice that people suffer, tears have welled up in my soul and anger in my stomach.

In recent years, the Poverty Alliance has promoted Challenge Poverty Week around the 17th of October. Its purpose is to highlight the scandal of poverty and to encourage us all to take action. As Christians there are very specific reasons why we should be involved in that struggle, including:

- Our understanding that all of humanity is made in the image of God (Genesis 1:27). Therefore, whenever a person is scarred by poverty, that person is less able to reflect the beauty and wonder of God. We are all poorer as a result and the glory of God shines a little less brightly in the world.
- Jesus' promise to continue to be with us in the poor and the dispossessed (Matthew 25:31). So whenever we choose to take sides with those who struggle for their dignity in the face of poverty we take sides with Jesus. I do not fully understand this mystery but I know it to be true in my own life and in the lives of others.

During Challenge Poverty Week, we would encourage congregations and individuals to pray for (and with) those who experience poverty. And certainly in your individual prayer life, do your best to pray for people by name. Poverty has a human face.

We would also encourage you to make friends with those who struggle against poverty. This is more than serving those who experience poverty, important though that is. Jesus calls us to friendship and not just service.

Finally we would encourage you to get involved in the messy work of solidarity and justice. Our calling is not simply to feed the hungry but to ask why, in a world and nation of such abundance, too many do not have enough to survive let alone flourish.

I hope that you will find this short resource helpful in these tasks both during Challenge Poverty Week and also throughout the year.

Open our hearts to receive from those who live on the margins of society.


Teach us to listen to the voice of the voiceless.
