Travels of a Social Justice Co-ordinator

"We shall overcome because the arc of the moral universe is long, but it bends towards justice". This is one of the quotations which forms part of the Martin Luther King Jr. Monument in Washington D.C. More than any other in the National Mall I knew I had to make time to go see Dr. King's memorial and reflect on the legacy he left. I was there on an exchange looking at issues around

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migration and sadly it certainly feels like we're a long way from justice. Long traditions of welcome and hospitality are under threat in the US like never before, and many who I met with, ranging from Dreamers (children of undocumented workers) to Congressmen fear an existential threat to this history. But even before I left the US we were learning about the treatment of the Windrush generation; ongoing for some years, but only exposed due to press involvement ahead of the Commonwealth summit. I also couldn't help but think of the young people I met in Calais last year; we are very vocal concerning Donald Trump's desire for a wall with Mexico, but there is condemning silence about the walls (miles and miles of additional fencing) around Calais and other ports which our taxes have been spent on; an extension of the 'hostile environment' policy to desperate children in northern France. One organisation we met in the US were based in a building, which also housed

the local ICE (Immigration and Customs Enforcement) Team. Our host told us there is a "silence and nod" culture of greeting in the building with nobody wanting to discuss anything in the corridors. My personal feeling was to padlock the door to prevent the ICE team from going out ever again, especially when we learnt of the current arrangements of 'bed quotas'; where private companies (including GEO who run Dungavel over here) are paid to keep the beds full, and will delay releasing detainees as they are paid per night by the federal government. In one of his easy essays Peter Maurin reflects on the ancient Greek custom where strangers and those in need were considered 'Ambassadors of God'; it makes the language we hear of 'scroungers begging', and 'swarms of illegal immigrants' even more shameful.
