This thought is with me as we try to finalise this newsletter, mostly as trying to find something positive or uplifting to say feels like a challenge. This time next year COP26, the 26<sup>th</sup> Conference of the Parties to the UN Convention on Climate Change will be hosted in Glasgow. A few days ago COP25, hosted by the Chilean government in Madrid has ended with a what even the most "balanced" of commentators are calling a 'disappointment'. It was hoped that COP25 would see the groundwork for new ambitious targets intended to limit the damage being done to the planet which would be formalised next year here in Scotland. Instead, even with a couple of extra days of negotiation the interests of the wealthy and powerful seemed to prevail. Agreements on reducing carbon became mired in requests for loopholes and opt-outs allowing large multinationals to continue to operate without disruption. As a result the measures agreed all fall short.

There was a distinct gap between the commitment and passion of the protesters who were in Madrid, joined with all those we have seen over the last year around the globe and many of those who were 'at the table'. It is also unavoidable to acknowledge as a Spanish friend of mine was commenting on twitter that the UK government (hosting the next COP) is led by a man who was replaced by a melting ice sculpture in a recent political debate on climate change.

But, we can't change the world with sad faces. The next 12 months we are uniquely placed to be pushing all out leaders to be taking the climate crisis seriously and committing to real change within our societies.

# News from St Andrew's Justice & Peace Group and St Nicholas' Primary School, Bearsden

Fr Mackle, parish priest of St Andrew's, Bearsden, blessed two saplings which will be planted in the school grounds next spring by the school Mini Vinnies group.

The saplings were left over from the event held at Carfin last April. At this event, saplings were planted to represent the eight dioceses in Scotland. Juniper saplings were chosen to



represent Justice and Scots Pine saplings were chosen to represent Peace. The surplus saplings were then taken by some members of the Justice and Peace commission of Glasgow and offered to local schools and parishes. St Andrew's, Bearsden accepted a Juniper sapling to plant in its 'Spirit of Peace' garden, and St Nicholas' Primary school agreed to take a Juniper sapling and a Pine sapling to set up a Justice and Peace garden in its new primary school grounds.

Accordingly, on Friday 6<sup>th</sup> December, the feast of St Nicholas, Fr Mackle blessed the two saplings which the Mini Vinnies are displaying in the photos along with the 40th anniversary Justice and Peace banner.


