Dear Justice and Peace Supporter,

As this summer comes to an end both the Amazon rainforest, and arctic tundra are experiencing wildfires. At the southern borders of the USA children are being ripped from their families and kept in cages, while European leaders are refusing to allow humanitarian rescue vessels working in the Mediterranean to dock. In Glasgow we see the Home Office and their for-profit partners SERCO seeking to throw out dozens of people from their houses, similarly, my latest travels took me to Liverpool where we learnt that 5 young people who had planned to come to spend a week at our summer camp instead found themselves removed from the UK with almost no warning. It's really easy to get despondent and feel that any progress of recent years is being

undone. But there are inspiring stories out there. The force of activists, including students prepared to walk out of school has put the climate crisis back on the agenda and governments are finally starting to recognise the emergency we are facing. While populist politicians continue to use their platforms to divide we can look to the heroism of people like Carola Rackete and Pia Klemp, along with officials and judges who defy unjust policies and ensure that ships are able to complete their rescues, and to the courageous witness of groups in the USA prepared to go to jail to disrupt the targeting of minorities by I.C.E under Donal Trump. Here in the UK we need to keep up the pressure on our politicians, and not allow the debates over Brexit to freeze all other activity. When the earliest members of the church proclaimed "Jesus is Lord" it was with the full knowledge that they were also saying "Caeser is not!". St Mary of Paris reflected that "the way to God lies through love of people. At the Last Judgement I shall not be asked whether I was successful in my ascetic exercises, nor how many bows and prostrations I made. Instead I shall be asked did I feed the hungry, clothe the naked, visit the sick and the prisoners. That is all I shall be asked. About every poor, hungry and imprisoned person the Saviour says 'I': 'I was hungry and thirsty, I was sick and in prison.' To think that he puts an equal sign between himself and anyone in need It fills me with awe" . We need to keep the pressure on politicians since we also know that Jesus is Lord, not them.

This Our Lives documentary tells the story of the Syrian refugee families who, since December 2015, have made the small Scottish island of Bute their home. Bute's newest residents have found sanctuary on this peaceful isle – a place of safety after the horrors of the Syrian war they have escaped.

2019 has marked a change in public attitudes to climate change driven in part by a huge new global protest movement. In this timely and powerful documentary, reporter Ben Zand gains access to the most important of the protest groups, Extinction Rebellion. He is with them for four months as they build towards "the rebellion" - 11 days of protest in April during which they take over and occupy four iconic locations in London.

The film follows three young people who have been inspired to join and lead the protests. Many are not only protesting for the first time in their lives but are also putting their liberty on the line to demand radical action from the government. We are there as they organise street protests and direct actions - risking arrest for their commitment to the cause.

The third item comes from filmmaker Tristan Daws. Made in 2016 using footage of 'the Jungle' refugee camp in Calais.
